### Part B. CV SUMMARY

I graduated from CEMFI in 2011. Currently, I am a Professor at the Institute of Economic Analysis (IAE-CSIC), Associate Research Professor at the Barcelona School of Economics, and an External Fellow at CReAM (University College London). I serve as (the first) Data Editor for *Econometrica*, *Quantitative Economics*, and *Theoretical Economics* and as a member of the Editorial Board of the *Review of Economic Studies*. Previously, I was (the first) Data Editor of the *Economic Journal* and the *Econometrics Journal*, a Guest Editor for *Labour Economics* for a special issue on migration, and Associate Editor of *SERIEs – The Journal of the Spanish Economic Association*.

My research lies at the intersection of Labor Economics and Structural Microeconometrics, focusing on migration, human capital, and labor market dynamics. My research has published in top journals, establishing my reputation as one of the leading economists in the field of migration. My single-

authored paper, "Immigration, Wages, and Education: A Labor Market Equilibrium Structural Model" (*Review of Economic Studies*, 2018), introduced the first structurally estimated micro-econometric equilibrium model of immigration and highlighted the importance of equilibrium adjustments for understanding the labor market consequences of immigration. This work has influenced much of the research on immigration impacts since its publication as reflected by its high number of citations. Another single-authored paper, "The Effect of Immigration on Wages: Exploiting Exogenous Variation at the National Level" (*Journal of Human Resources*, 2018), provides an innovative method for identifying exogenous variation to estimate the wage effects of immigration. This paper has garnered significant citations and is widely recognized for advancing this field, and influenced the policy debate, being discussed by a committee of the U.S. Senate. My paper "Labor Market Competition and the Assimilation of Immigrants" (R&R at *American Economic Review*), with Christoph Albert and Albrecht Glitz introduces a radically novel view about the reasons why immigrant wage convergence to natives has reduced in the recent decades. My work on international migration decisions, published in *SERIEs – The Journal of the Spanish Economic Association*, earned the Outstanding Research Contribution Award for the best paper published in the journal from 2016-2019.

Beyond academia, my research has had notable societal impact. For example, my co-authored paper "Marriage and Health: Selection, Protection, and Assortative Mating" (*European Economic Review*, 2018, with Nezih Guner and Yuliya Kulikova) received wide media coverage and was a finalist for the prestigious *La Vanguardia* Science Award, showcasing how my work reaches audiences beyond academia. I also co-edited the book *Understanding Migration with Macroeconomics* (Palgrave MacMillan, 2020), which synthesizes significant contributions in migration economics.

I have supervised 10 PhD theses (including ongoing ones), with placements in outstanding universities such as Toulouse School of Economics, University of Bristol, University of Bologna, and Universitat de Barcelona, international institutions such as the World Bank, United Nations and the OECD, think tanks such as the Rockwool Foundation, and the private sector. In addition, I have advised over 40 master theses, with many students gaining admission to top-tier PhD programs such as Princeton, University College London, and Boston University. My commitment to mentoring the next generation of researchers is a key aspect of my academic work.

My international reputation is supported by a robust record of competitive grants and awards. I have been the principal investigator of an ERC Starting Grant and I am currently the principal investigator of an ERC Consolidator Grant, prestigious and highly competitive international grants, and have also led various national projects, including Retos Jóvenes Investigadores, La Caixa Foundation grants, and others. My role in promoting reproducibility standards in economics is pioneering and groundbreaking, becoming the first Data Editor for the journals of two of the most prominent associations of economists worldwide (Econometric Society and the Royal Economic Society).

I delivered presentations at over 60 leading institutions, participated in over 40 international conferences, many as a invited or keynote speaker, and held short visiting positions at several prestigious institutions worldwide. My organizational roles include establishing two renowned international conferences in Barcelona and serving on scientific and local committees for several of the major conferences internationally. I have been an elected Council Member of the Spanish Economic Association and served on COSME's Board. My reputation is further evidenced by extensive referee service for top-tier journals and collaborations with distinguished scholars, such as Robert A. Miller, Nezih Guner, or Albrecht Glitz.
